## **Sport Premium Report**

January 2017

The PE and Sport Grant is funding for primary schools that is spent on provision of PE and sport. We aim to use this money to encourage healthy lifestyles and to develop the children's enjoyment of sport and physical activity from an early age.

In the financial year 2014-15 the school received £8442.

In the financial year 2016-16 the school received £8442.

In the financial year 2016-17 the school received £8437.

In 2015, the school began extending the use of the specialist teachers who provided PPA cover and used them to support staff development. The advisor focused on developing teaching and subject knowledge in physical education (PE). Since they began, the specialist teachers have worked alongside all teachers at least once and support staff to help them develop their own skills through bespoke training.

The school has signed up to an inter-school sports league offering a wide range of sports including goal ball and boccia alongside more mainstream sports. As well as this, additional sports clubs are provided for the children.

The school aims to:

- enhance the development of physical literacy and physical development through outdoor learning.
- enhance the development of indoor and outdoor space to develop gymnastics, dance, games, athletics, outdoor and adventurous, team building and problem solving opportunities.
- invest in resources and equipment to support the teaching of physical education.
- subsidise sporting activities in school time and after school to enable all children to access a range of sporting activities, including inter-school sports competitions.
- implement specialist sports clubs in school that children may not otherwise have access to outside of school.

Below is a summary of how we have used, or are intending to use, the Sport Premium in the school year 2016-17 as compared with the previous school year:

We invest heavily in swimming as we believe every child should swim every year regardless of ability.

We are investing more heavily in resources, notably equipping our hall in order to enhance the space available for gymnastics, team building and problem solving.

## Impact

The impact our spending is measured through:

- pupil voice opportunities measuring the interest of children in different areas of the PE curriculum;
- direct feedback from teachers on the quality of support offered by specialists in physical education teaching and development of physical literacy and physical fluency;
- evaluation of the teaching of physical education lessons;
- reports to governors and headteacher;
- evaluation of the quality of provision of extra-curricular clubs in relation to physical activity and school sport;
- the number of children engaging in inter-school sporting activities;
- the quality of provision and opportunities within the curriculum to take part in 'active learning' and 'outdoor learning'.

We have seen:

- A high level of interest in sports clubs increased participation in inter-school sports competitions. By January 2017, every year 6 child had taken part in at least one inter-school tournament.
- increased staff confidence in the teaching of PE
- improved sports facilities within the school including the addition of a hall and indoor gymnastics equipment
- money allocated to equipping the new school hall
- 100% of children leave Y6 with the national curriculum requirement regarding swimming. The vast majority exceed this.
- more pupils taking part in specialist sports, such as boccia and curling 20% of the school signed up to a lunchtime curling club in terms 1&2 of 2015 as opposed to only 8% doing boccia the previous year
- The average attendance at clubs has remained steady at around 18 children per club offered but we have offered a wide variety of clubs to ensure that high proportion of the school attends at least one after school club.
- Average attendance at each sports club was up in 2015-16 from the previous year.
